Construction Update

Lake Local Schools' building projects are underway and progressing on schedule at Lake High School, the new Lake Elementary that will house grades 2-6, and Uniontown Elementary, which will become our new PreK- Grade 1 school.

Middle/High School

The two-story addition is progressing with many of the new educational spaces beginning to come to life! Construction crews are busy working on the interior finishes of the new addition. Most work is currently focused on the second floor, which will then transition to the first floor as they work their way out of the building. The installation of drywall is nearing completion with painting, ceiling grids, cabinets, and lights in progress. The new learning pods with four classrooms and shared Extended Learning Areas or "ELAs" are coming together,

including the installation of the glass overhead doors. The "Collaboration Stairs," a two-story space that sprawls between the first and second floors, is sure to be a prime gathering space that students will enjoy.

Through the remainder of the winter, contractors will continue to work on finishes, flooring, and installation of

doors, lockers, and other specialty items. The final bid packages for the middle school and partial high school demolition, furniture, and technology have all been awarded by Hammond. The Phase one building addition is looking great and on track to be open for the 2018-2019 school year!

We are moving into the final stretch of completing the new Lake Elementary School for grades 2-6! The building has been completely enclosed and benefiting from temporary heat since Thanksgiving. Contractors are working on the installation of many interior finishes including drywall, painting, casework, lights, sprinklers,

Blue Streak Buddies Celebrate Valentines Day

Creating friendships, sharing experiences, and gaining a better appreciation for classmates are all part of the *Blue Streak Buddy* program at Lake Middle and High School.

Bringing together students with multiple disabilities (MD) and mainstream students at the two schools, the Buddies program allows interaction and relationships between these students to occur. Together students participate in activities like an in-school Christmas party, attending a Rubber Ducks game, or working collaboratively on a classroom project.

"All students are provided classroom instruction in the least restrictive environment for their personal learning. Many of our students have very specialized learning needs and this can take them away from academic classes with their peers. As a consequence of this, there becomes less opportunity for social interaction that goes along with the high school experience. Not only do our students miss out on meeting a majority of their peers, but also those typical peers miss out on discovering the wonderful people our students are. This experience has opened their eyes," said Janet Mackall, Lake High School MD teacher for grades 9-12.

Recently Lake sophomore **Janson Smith** organized and planned a special Valentines Day surprise for all the students in the Buddy Program – without telling teachers or staff what he was doing. Under Janson's direction, mainstream classmates created valentine boxes for each high school and middle school buddy, with each box personalized to reflect the students' particular interests.

Janson also wrote a short Valentine's note to the Lake MH staff and aides he has come to know while participating as a Blue Streak Buddy. "The world needs more people like you. While yes, I mean that literally as the Special Ed field is often lacking in qualified educators, I mean more people that are willing to dedicate their career to giving a chance to those who society often overlook," Janson wrote.



"My eyes have been opened wide this year after making the decision to join this program... These kids and their unconditional love have given me such a sense of comfort that I would never forfeit."

"We are definitely blessed here at Lake," said Mrs. Mackall. "It is often difficult for the students in our particular classrooms to express their feelings to us. I like to think that they (like Janson so eloquently wrote) feel our dedication."

Two New School Buses Will Join Fleet

Two new school buses will be added to the district's bus fleet by mid-March 2018, according to district Business Manager Jeff Breit.

Driving in to the Lake Local bus garage later this month will be two conventional size buses, with capacity to carry between 77-78 students. They will replace two buses being traded in: Bus 35, a 1998 model with 100,146 miles, and Bus 42, a 1998 model with 122,592 miles.

Breit said the bus routes to be traveled by the new arrivals have not yet been determined.

The district purchased two buses last year as well.

First Grade

First graders have enjoyed learning about recycling from our friend Wendy at Stark County Recycling. She has taught us what materials are made of, and how to reuse or recycle many items we use daily.

The 100th day of school was a success. Students built structures using 100 cups, worked through 100 math problems, wrote 100 words, completed 100 exercise, and collected 100 cans to donate. The school as a whole was very excited to donate so many cans to the Fish Pantry.

Students have begun practicing for the spring concert and look forward to starting their habitat projects. Make sure to mark your calendars to attend our concert **April 4, 2018 at 6 p.m.** The students will be singing and showcasing their habitat projects.

Third Grade

Third graders at Hartville Elementary are finishing up an economics unit where they are selling snacks to their classmates. They discovered the demand and supply of each item, kept track of expenses and profit,



and advertised during the month of January. This was a great way to use our standards in a project-based environment.

Students learned about rocks and minerals during February, and this will continue in March. We will investigate how rocks change, and discover the three different kinds of rocks. Later on, we will explore habitats and how animals adapt to their environment. We will dissect owl pellets, and Walsh University students will come to Hartville Elementary to describe different aspects of habitats and climate and how they affect animals.

Also, our third grade has been collecting pop can tabs for the Ronald McDonald House of Akron since the beginning of the school year. We have filled one of our containers in the hallway and the other one is partway full. Please help us as we continue to save the pop tabs throughout the year.

Art Students Collaborate to Create Second Digital Mural

Installation will be in New Lake Elementary Building

Students in grades 1-5 in Mrs. Susa's and Miss Stegner's art classes recently finished their individual "selfies" for a **second** collaborative digital mural that will be installed in time for the grand unveiling of the new Lake Elementary School next year.

We are so excited that student work will be showcased in this way, and are even more thrilled that we have been able to work with our on-site artists, architects, and designers at Sol-Harris Day to take these concepts to fruition for our little artists. Each student used their knowledge of the proportions of the face and a hand-held mirror to illustrate and highlight their personal characteristics in the work.



Student selfies were selected and scanned, and will take their place in a new twelve foot by eight foot visual representation as the *faces of Lake Elementary*. The large scale mural will be another wondrous focal point within the new building. We are eager to share the "*Dot*" mural and the "*Selfie*" mural with our school, staff, and community and look forward to celebrating these accomplishments.

Student Art to be Permanently Displayed

During the 2017 school year, Joni Susa's third grade artists at Hartville Elementary participated in a project inspired by famous artist, George Rodrigue, the creator of Blue Dog Art. and ceiling tiles. Classrooms pods are taking shape with the installation of glass overhead garage doors which will open up into shared Extended Learning Areas. Some specialty items like lockers, marker boards, and tack boards are being put in place in select areas. Looking ahead, we will begin exterior site work including sidewalks, curbs, and parking lots. All work is on schedule and quickly moving towards the grand opening for the 2018-2019 school year!

Pre-K- Grade 1 Elementary School (currently Uniontown Elementary)

The addition and renovation project has been put out to bid and Hammond is in the process of awarding contracts. We will start work on the classroom, media center, and gymnasium additions, with renovations to the existing school to commence in June, 2018. When work is completed after winter break of the 2018-2019 school year, Uniontown will reopen as a grades PK-1 school.



In late January 2018, Lake High School Mock Trial students from the Legal Studies program had three teams, named Red, Blue, and White, participate in a District Mock Trial competition. Mock Trial allows high school students to defend and prosecute a case about a current constitutional issue, and they serve as an attorney, witness, or bailiff.

Attorneys write their own opening and closing statements, and prepare questions they want to ask their witnesses. Witnesses must memorize their testimony, which can be anywhere from four to nine pages long, while bailiffs are in charge of the court room, swear in witnesses, and keep track of the time. Cases are presented in front of a real judge, simulating an actual trial, with numerous Mock Trial high school teams competing against one another.

Lake's Red team consisted of ten members. Two of them, Grace Weisel and Niko Davis, received outstanding witness awards, while one outstanding attorney award was given to Kayla Saffel. The Blue team had eight members, with two outstanding attorney awards presented to Autumn Crawford and Ben Nist. Ten Lake juniors and seniors were on the White team, with two, George Bogner and Hunter LeVan, receiving outstanding attorney awards.

Due to their strong performances at the district level, all three teams advanced to the Regional Mock Trial Competition which took place February 16, 2018. This was the first time in school history that all Lake teams advanced to this level of competition. Earning Outstanding Attorney Awards for the Blue Streaks were Julia Genovese, Hunter LeVan, and Benjamin Nist. Oustanding Witness Award winners were Hunter LeVan and Grace Weisel.

Low-Interest Student Loans Offered to Stark County Grads



Students looking to further their education can turn to a local foundation for low-interest student loans.

The Canton Student Loan Foundation, a non-profit organization, is offering student loans to Stark County graduates. The loans can be applied to any undergraduate course of study, including four-year college degrees, two-year associate degrees and degrees from technology and trade schools.

An annual interest of 6 percent is deferred while the student is attending classes, so the effective interest rate is 1.5 to 2 percent, much lower than most other sources. There are no fees.

Students may borrow up to \$12,000 total over the course of their education. Freshmen can receive \$3,000 per year, and students who are closer to graduation may be able to receive more per year.

Graduate school loans are also available. In order to borrow funds for graduate school, the student must be a current Canton Student Loan Foundation student. These funds have been made possible through financial contributions made by George and Anna Casper and the efforts of a volunteer advisory committee composed of Masons from the various Masonic lodges in Canton, Ohio. The Trust is administered by The Stark Community Foundation.

To be eligible for a loan, students must have graduated from a Stark County high school, have and maintain a 2.0 grade point average, be pursuing an undergraduate course of study and be attending school on a full-time basis (enrolled for at least 12 credit hours per term).

"Increased training or earning a degree can mean earning thousands of dollars more each year so being able to earn a degree is a life-changing experience," says Kimberly Leggett, Executive Director of The Canton Student Loan Foundation. "It has always been

our goal to help our local Stark County students pursue their dreams without the burden of high-interest-rate loans."

Since 1922, The Canton Student Loan Foundation has extended over \$35 million to 5,800 Stark County students. Recipients have gone on to careers in education, medicine, law, marketing, cosmetology, auto technology and countless other areas. More than half of the student borrowers return to live and work in Stark County following the completion of their education.



Farewell Hartvillle and Lake Elementary: Event Notes

- Our special event taking place Saturday, April 7, 2018, is a collaborative effort between Lake Local Schools, the Lake Township Historical Society, and Lake alumni. The current Hartville Elementary building, built 91 years ago and originally known as Hartville School, opened in 1927 for students in grades 1-12. In constant use through the decades, it has been remodeled and expanded during its 91 years, and currently houses students in grades K-3. It is the oldest operating school building in Stark County.
- Lake Elementary, built in 1954 originally as a new wing for Hartville High School, currently houses students in grades 4-5.
- One of the 'acts' scheduled to perform in Hartville Auditorium will be a quartet of Lake High School Orchestra. The quartet members include juniors Alex Xuan, Abbie Neo, and Emily Weil, and sophomore Nick Desjardins.
- Other performers include Uniontown Elementary kindergartners led by **Natalie Deckerd**, Hartville Elementary kindergarteners from **Mark Pullen**'s class, and various musicians selected by **Danielle Shaub**, music/choir teacher for Lake/Hartville Elementary, and Lake Middle School.
- Dance moves presented by the Lake High School Dance Team and members of high school Drama classes in our re-creation of a 1950s Y-Teen dance in the Little Gym may include the twist, waltz,

wedding dance, pony, congo line, and limbo. Fans of the musical *Grease* will also want to watch our dancers perform to the song *You're the One That I Want*. Dances and proms were held in the little gym years ago when part of Hartville High School.



Mosey Gingerich, a Hartville School Amish student from years ago and longtime local resident, will ring a hand held school bell to designate the start of events throughout the evening. This recreates a role he fulfilled from the third —ninth grade, when he ran down the school halls ringing the bell twice daily to indicate the start of the school day before 9 a.m., and the return to classrooms after lunch around 12:45 p.m. He was initially paid a nickel a week as the bell ringer, but thinks he may have gotten a raise of a dime a week during later years.




